Are You Ready for REAL ID?



Starting Oct. 1, 2020, travelers 18 years and older will need a REAL ID-compliant form of identification to board a commercial flight in the United States. Here are some key things to know:

You'll need more than a standard state-issued driver's license to fly. You'll need a REAL ID-compliant license or another acceptable form of ID – like a valid passport, Global Entry card, permanent resident card or U.S. military ID – to fly within the U.S. The full list of accepted IDs can be found at TSA.gov/real-id.

Oregon DMV won't offer a REAL ID compliant license until July 6, 2020. You

can see the problem – long lines at DMV offices as residents scramble to upgrade their license before Oct. 1. To avoid the rush, consider getting another form of TSA-accepted ID now. Explore your options at **Oregon.gov/REALID.**

Washington state is issuing REAL ID compliant licenses now. They are referred to as an Enhanced Driver License or Enhanced ID Card. Unlike other states, Washington's REAL ID license does not have a star – but it is still a valid REAL ID. Learn more at **id2020wa.com.**

Getting a REAL ID-compliant license requires specific documents. You will need to submit an original birth certificate or passport, a Social Security card, proof of residency and documentation of any name changes. The Oregon DMV has a tool to help you to prepare your document checklist at **Oregon.gov/REALID.**

It's not too early to get started. Most states expect long lines as the REAL ID deadline gets closer. Avoid those long lines by getting what you need today. See the sidebar for how you can get a free passport photo at PDX this month!

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
